## Holy Week and Easter

— A message from Pastor Becky, our Priest-In-Charge

The young couple was running late. They had an infant and toddler in tow, and were nervous because neither of the parents had attended church since they were children themselves. They pulled into the parking lot of the church they had found on Google and encountered the oddest sight: 120 people were marching around the outer courtyard of the building, waving something that looked like a reed back and forth, and singing a song—badly, it must be admitted. That this young couple did not climb right back in their car and go to Starbucks is a testament to the power of the Spirit. Instead, they grasped the palm fronds thrust in their hands and gamely joined the procession, perplexed but also curious. What on earth was going on?

Right. What do we try to do during Holy Week? Holy Week is the last week of Lent, beginning with Palm Sunday and ending in the twilight of Holy Saturday, the day before Easter. Unless you are now over 1,600 years old or under 40, however, many of us may not remember doing much with Holy Week when we were younger. Commemorations of Holy Week were first developed in the 4th and 5th centuries, and these traditions flourished in many elaborate forms throughout the Middle Ages. Such ceremonials were disfavored during Reformation, and eventually forgotten. In the mid-20th century the church began rediscovering the ancient traditions and adapting them for our time and contemporary theology,

enabling many to experience intense spiritual renewal within Holy Week rituals.

During his entire earthly ministry, Jesus lived and preached the values of the Reign of God, which culminated in deadly conflict with religious and civic power structures. During Holy Week, we enter into the pivotal events of the last days of his life. **We invite and expect the people of Good Shepherd to come during the week and participate in Jesus' amazing and disturbing story as it continues to unfold,** seeking your own place in his story in this place and this time.

*Palm Sunday (April 17th)* will be a festive day. When Jesus enters Jerusalem, the whole city celebrates Jesus' message and charisma, calls him Messiah, giving him a king's welcome. We will join the exuberance and shout "Hosanna!"

Unlike most churches, the passion story will not be read this day. We do not want to "fast forward" into the week just to ensure folks do not skip from the festal shouts of Palm Sunday to the miracle of the Resurrection on Easter. We trust you to show up and take part whenever you possibly can during the rest of the week.

*Holy Tuesday (April 19th)*. Movies that retell Christ's story from a new perspective can be especially effective in bring-

ing alive the import of Holy Week. A private screening of *Godspell* will be shown. This movie was shocking to people when it came out my freshman year in college; it remains an enigmatic and engaging presentation of the Gospel according to Matthew.

*Holy Wednesday (April 20th)*. Evening Prayer will be said at 5:30, a contemplative and holy way of preparing for the intensity of the rest of the week. Immediately after, the final session of Christianity 101 will engage one of the most important questions of Christian theology: why did Jesus have to die? This concerns the question of the atonement, the reconciliation of God with humanity. Most do not know that there are several views, and none of them are "official" church doctrine. Which one resonates with you?

## Holy Week

— Continued from page one

*Maundy Thursday (April 21st)* is the day when the triumphant shouts of Palm Sunday are drowned out by whispers of conspiracy, betrayal and intrigue. All of the events of this day take place in the context of the Jewish festival of Passover that Jesus celebrates with his disciples. First, Jesus, their teacher, Lord and Savior, and host at the supper shows them the nature of humble discipleship by washing the feet of his friends, and commanding them to love each other as he loves them. (It is *mandatum*, the Latin word for “command,” that gives “Maundy Thursday” its name.) We, too, will enter into this deeply personal cleansing ritual, offering everyone who attends services the opportunity to wash the feet of a friend or loved one. We will then recall how Jesus celebrated the Jewish Passover seder as his Last Supper. We will explain the profound symbols and significance of the seder, and celebrate the Eucharist in this context. After that, we will hear the stories of denial, betrayal and denunciation that precede the horrors of Good Friday. The intense evening will then segue into the solemn all-night prayer vigil, where we will take turns to “stay awake and keep watch” with Christ as he faces the grim reality of the execution to which he will soon be sentenced.

*Good Friday (April 22nd)* is the most solemn day of the Christian year. On this day, the current disciples of the Christ re-imagine the unfolding scenes of the final hours of Jesus’ life: his rejection by his own people, the trial before Pilate, and his execution. At noon, we will continue the long-standing Good Shepherd tradition of doing the Stations of the Cross in downtown Dunedin. In the evening, we will hold a service of darkness and shadows, pain and repentance as we recite the Passion of our Lord and

reflect on the passages of betrayal, cruelty, violence and repudiation of God.

*The Great Vigil of Easter (April 23rd)* is the first celebration of the Feast of the Resurrection. Beginning just before sundown on Holy Saturday, we will tell the wonderful news of God’s love for creation and promise of deliverance, and God’s acceptance of us as beloved children and share the joy of the Lord’s triumph over death. We will complete what we began on Ash Wednesday: celebrate our baptism into the Body of Christ and share Holy Communion with the Risen Lord as our host. Afterward, we will gather in joyful fellowship.

*Easter – The Feast of the Resurrection (April 24th)* is how we know Jesus is who he said he is. His resurrection is

the best thing that ever happened since the creation of the world. Christ is alive! We will welcome this happy morning beginning with a pre-dawn sunrise service and continuing with three more celebrations of freedom, renewal and hope. Hail thee, festival day!

Indeed, it was this glorious celebration and promise of a new life in Christ that kept bringing those young parents back to church, eager not only to hear more about God’s love, but to experience the incomparable joy of belonging to a community centered in that love and reaching out to the weary world with words of hope and acts of service. The next year the entire family was baptized together, continuing their procession into the heart of the mystery of God begun the year before with palm fronds clutched in their fists.

## NetsforLife® Inspiration Fund

### — Story from the Field

ANGOLA - Malaria is by far the most common cause of illness and death in Angola— children under age five account for half of all malaria deaths. More than half the population lives in malaria-prone areas where transmission occurs throughout the entire year.

Malita, a pregnant young mother of two children, had just returned home to Angola with her family from neighboring northern Namibia after fleeing a 27-year long civil war that ended in 2002. Preparations were being made to cultivate the family's farm, as they heard vegetables were selling well in the local market. Soon after her return home, "the fever" struck her oldest child. Malita had no idea what caused it; her mother-in-law said it was "bad sugar cane." He died in her arms in less than one day from "the fever" — malaria.

#### Protection

Each day, malaria takes the lives of nearly 3,000 children in sub-Saharan Africa. To protect Malita and families in the region from malaria, Episcopal

Relief & Development has implemented NetsforLife® a malaria prevention program.

Together with her mother-in-law, Malita journeyed from her village of Namakunde to the town of Ondjiva to receive a long-lasting insecticide-treated net (LLIN) distributed by the Anglican Diocese of Angola, Episcopal Relief & Development's local NetsforLife® partner. Malita left with a net and knowledge about the symptoms of malaria and how, quickly, to seek treatment.

#### Information

Malita became a volunteer community malaria agent. Today, she makes sure those most vulnerable to malaria are protected — children under five, pregnant women, the elderly and sick. She teaches women how to use the nets, how to detect the symptoms of malaria and where to seek treatment.

Malita's knowledge and experience saves lives in her village. Her willingness to help others prevent needless deaths from malaria, and builds the

health, well-being, agricultural production and economic vitality of her small community.

#### Statistics

To date, NetsforLife® has distributed 90,340 nets and trained 1036 volunteers to the benefit of 361,855 individuals in Angola. Working at the grassroots level within the Episcopal community, the Inspiration Fund will help NetsforLife® deliver upon its promise to distribute 7 million nets over the next three years. Combined with education and training, this work will save more than 21 million lives across 30,000 African communities over the next three years.

## Altar Flowers Policy Change Coming

— Thoughts about our altar flowers by Pastor Becky

Most weeks the altar flowers are “Given to the Glory of God.” This means that no one in the congregation sponsored and paid for our two vases, a cost of \$50 per week. A quick look at our financial report showed that the operating budget absorbed over \$1,000 to cover expenses for flowers.

That prompted the question: how important are flowers to this worshipping community? Yes, of course they are beautiful symbols of life and hope and creation. I love fresh flowers as much as anyone, but at what cost? We’ve systematically been cutting our outreach budget (along with many other line

items) to be fiscally lean and responsible. I have to admit, if this church has \$1,000 of discretionary money to spend, personally, I’d rather help the desperate eat, or be housed, or get a tankful of gas to get to work. Others of you, however, may not feel the same way, and are of the opinion that flowers are as legitimate an expenditure for the gathered worshipping community as wine, bread and candles. I certainly understand and appreciate that perspective.

In Lent, traditionally we don’t put fresh flowers in the chancel. During this season of reflection, I invite our congregation to consider a proposal that

comes from the Altar Guild, the Worship Committee and the Finance Committee: On any given Sunday, flowers will be ordered for the chancel only if there are sponsors for **both vases** for that week.

### Communicate

Please do not hesitate to let me or a member of Vestry or the chair of one of the above-named committees know your thoughts about the proposed change. Of course, the simplest way to deal with the matter would be for people to sponsor one or more weeks, which might quickly solve the problem! A sign-up sheet is on a clipboard in the back of the church.
