## It's Great to be Here!

— A message from our Priest-In-Charge, Becky Robbins-Penniman

I've been praying for, dreaming about, and preparing to enter this community for several months now, and Gus and I are thrilled the time has finally arrived! I'm very eager to get to know you, and I'm sure you have lots of questions, expectations, hopes, and maybe even some anxieties about me. I also imagine many of you are wondering how we will get acquainted, become friends, and develop into a vibrant church together. I can't cover *all* of that in the first newsletter article, but here are some of my plans to begin accomplishing those things:

### In Our Worship

To introduce you to my theology, my story, and the hopes I have about creating community, I'll be doing a five-week sermon series entitled *Becoming Church Together*. Centering on the Gospel texts in the lectionary, I'll briefly explore a different topic each week:

**Week 1:** Sept. 5 ..... Luke 14:25–33 ..... *The God I Love And Serve*

(An outline of my theology and faith.)

**Week 2:** Sept. 12 ..... Luke 15:1–10 ..... *Who Am I?*

(A glimpse into how my personal story grounds my faith and theology.)

**Week 3:** Sept. 19 ..... Luke 16:1–13 ..... *Who Are You?*

(The gifts and strengths of the congregation I've learned about so far.)

**Week 4:** Sept. 26 ..... Luke 16:19–31 ..... *What's The Church For?*

(The mission of the Church, and our congregation's part of that mission.)

**Week 5:** Oct. 3 ..... Luke 17:5–10 ..... *What Are We Going To Become Together?*

(Some broad visioning about our future.)

### In Our Congregation

When I interviewed with the Search Committee, they asked me the first thing I would do when I arrived, and my answer was, "Listen, listen, listen." God has been present and active in the Church of the Good Shepherd for a long time, and I want to find out as much as I can about your stories, what you love about this congregation, what your hopes and dreams are, and what your gifts, talents, skills and passions are. To do that, I asked the Vestry to begin scheduling a series of interviews and cottage meetings as soon as possible. In addition, I want to visit with each person or family who wants one-on-one time— also as soon as possible.

### In Our Future

Surely we all want to see this congregation become even more healthy and vibrant than any of us might dare to

hope, with a Sunday School full of kids, programs that excite our minds and spirits, and ministries that bring hope and healing to our community. The entire congregation will be invited to actively engage in a process to hear what God is calling us to do. However, there are some immediate steps that my experience in a growing congregation has taught me are easy and effective, and which we're implementing right away. The first one you'll notice is that we'll be printing out the *entire* service in the worship bulletins— even the words to the hymns— to help make worshipping with us simple and enjoyable, even for strangers to the Episcopal liturgy.

Back to the listening part. The scripture verse that has been speaking to me since I began discerning a call to serve you is Matthew 13:52:

And [Jesus] said to them, “Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old.”

What you have lived and done at the Church of the Good Shepherd is “old” to you and “new” to me, and there is treasure here. Likewise, the experiences I have had are “old” to me and “new” to

you, and I believe there is treasure there, also. As we listen to each other, we will discover these old and new treasures together, and use them to proclaim and live the Reign of God here in this corner of the paradise God has given us lucky Floridians to live in. Please let me know what you’re thinking— I’m all ears.

In closing, I want to share with you one of my favorite prayers. This prayer has sustained, challenged and energized me during my entire ordained ministry, especially at times of transition and transformation:

Blessed are you, God of growth and discovery;  
yours is the inspiration that has altered and changed our lives;  
yours is the power that has brought us to new dangers and opportunities.  
Set us, your new creation, to walk through this new world watching and learning, loving and trusting, until your kingdom comes.  
Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

## The “E” word... Evangelism

— A message from Brotherhood of St Andrew Director, Gene Belote

A few weeks ago, when Father William Dopp was our supply priest, he conducted an adult forum using his book, The Tale Of Two Churches. Much of what he said about successful churches in this day and time was that the “E” word was a part of every ministry that brought them success. He said, “As important as evangelism is to the life of the church, we tiptoe around the subject, hoping that no one will ask us to be a part of it. The problem for most of us in the Christian faith today is that we are either too shy or afraid to go out and be a messenger for the Kingdom of God.”

Father Dopp also pointed out some people are already evangelists and don’t know it. By being an active part of a ministry in the church, you are telling people the good news just through your actions. “When we act in a Christ like manner, we are proclaiming the Kingdom of God. When we serve others in Christ’s name we are sharing the good news, and when we let our light shine as Jesus taught, we are truly evangelists.”

### What is an Evangelist?

In Father Dopp’s book he said, “Many of us picture an evangelist as someone

standing on the corner asking, ‘Brother, have you been saved?’” All we need to do is to encourage others to ‘come and see,’ as Phillip said to his friend Nathaniel (John 1:46). For that reason Dopp contends that all Christian ministries should have an element of evangelism. What we do should also reach outside our doors to the community.”

### Relationships

Several years ago I gave an adult forum on, “What is Evangelism?” My opening line was, “It’s all about relationships.” Evangelism in its literal meaning is telling good news. For Christians, evangelism is telling of the gospel, the good news of Jesus Christ— his life, death and resurrection.

Most of us came to know God through relationships. We may have a special person in our life like a parent, grandparent, teacher, coach or priest— who each, in his or her own way, proclaimed the good news by word or deed. It may not even have seemed “religious” at the time, but it was. Been there? Me too!

We have many opportunities every day to smile, be thankful, and do good things for others. We all know many people and we often become a part of each other’s lives. All of us have a personal story of

how God’s particular mercy helped us through a time of trial. We are also often moved to make changes after hearing a story of another’s experiences in life. Your story could give someone you know the change of a lifetime. They may ask what is it in you that gave you the love of God? This presents you with an opportunity to invite them to “come and see.” It is as simple as that! You have performed an act of an evangelist.

### Acts of Kindness

Have you ever been thirsty and get two glasses because you thought maybe someone else is also in need of a drink? Little acts of kindness make a lasting impression. Opening a door, offering your seat when none are available, saying, ‘have a blessed day,’ are all simple Christ like examples we can do every day. They may prompt someone to ask what makes you so happy and giving. Then you can tell them that it is all the inspiration from the love given you by Jesus Christ. This may be just what they needed to hear.

So begin today by letting the Holy Spirit work in you and give you the words at the proper time to become the evangelist you already are. Pick a ministry that will help you show your light.

## Clearwater Deanery Dominican Mission Trip 2010

— A report from Vickie Hall

After months of meetings, Clearwater Deanery synchronized their watches for a 5:30 a.m. departure on Saturday, July 24th at Tampa International Airport with Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic as its final destination. Team members as far north as Ontario, Canada, (Trevor Kimpton), and as deep south as Atlanta, GA (Liz Lewis), and Chattanooga, TN (Andy Gill) joined up in Miami with local members: Bob and Rene Liles, Ernie Colquette and Olga Clayton, Holy Trinity; Deacon Carl Crump, St. Stephens; Cecily Holbrook, St. Alfred's; Chuck Gargola and Diane Urwiller, Good Samaritan; and Vickie Hall, Good Shepherd. Once the team passed through Dominican immigration without any glitches, the first task was to identify all of the carefully "stuffed within the legal limits" luggage to lug outdoors and locate the Episcopal Dominican representative, Karen Carol who had a travel trailer pulled by a van ready to transport luggage and passengers for the 4-hour drive to Barahona, a city not so distant from the Haitian border.

For the "newbies," one of the first greetings that made them well aware they weren't in the U.S. any more was a lunch stop at Pollo Rey where those who ordered first, received their food last, or an initial announced wait time of 2-3 minutes turned into 15. On the other hand, the virtue of patience is not something found behind the wheel. "Newbies" were treated to an eye-witness experience of a right out of a movie car chase scene when the driver played "chicken as he made his way through the streets of the capital.

Once outside of civilization, the scenery changed to miles of banana trees and sugar cane dominating the foreground with picturesque mountains in the background. "Are we there yet?" became an inevitable question as the travel weary

group bounced along the road lined with not just walkers, but women walking while balancing large objects on top of their heads. Not just motorcycle riders, but motorcycles with at least two and not uncommonly three or more passengers.

### Where Dreams Come True

Upon arrival at the Hotel Costa Larimar, "where the dreams come true," team members met up with the Dominican Development Group (DDG) director, Dr. Bob Stevens, who had arrived ahead of time after attending a conference with Bishop Holguin in Panama. After dinner, team members retired early to prepare themselves for the next morning's two church services at Jesus Peregrino and La Redencion. It was a bittersweet time of worship as this was Padre Nephtali's last Sunday in Barahona, but the joy of the Spirit was not squelched in the praise and worship and passing of the peace to the beat of drums, rhythmic guira and animated singing.

Monday through Friday the teams divided into VBS at Jesus Peregrino and construction at La Redencion. At Jesus Peregrino, there were around 200 kids from ages 4-12. Deacon Carl began each day in a time of devotion with the team, Dominican teachers and staff. Liz thrilled the kids with her "Boom Chicka Boom" and parachute, while Andy and Carl had a chance to rehearse for their American Idol audition as they lead the kids in singing what was in their hearts with "Tengo Gozo en mi Corazon." Olga was the indispensable "water girl" after the P.E. workout and led each class in a prayer before they ate. Diane, ever professional despite retirement; after all, she even sacrificed her Cuisinart for making the crayon "stained glass," spent weeks preparing new and different crafts each day for both the morn-

ing and afternoon sessions. Mid-week we got a visit from our Canadian neighbor, Trevor, who quickly became quite popular as the guy with the stickers. Kids were crazy about getting stickers, so he'd ask questions, and those with the correct answers were rewarded.

Outside of the Batey (ghetto), the construction team spent all day on the second story roof of La Redencion. They returned each afternoon looking like they'd been run over by a truck; resulting in a contest as to who was the dirtiest by the end of their long, hot, grueling day of tying rebar. Their perseverance paid off as they almost finished the second story. The following week, the roof was poured! Proving once again, all things are possible with Jesus!

### Team Work

The camaraderie of our team is a gift from God; after all, it is the Spirit that unites us in our effort to serve Him through serving others. We regularly joked about the hotel's motto being a place "where dreams come true;" however, the fact that God could touch individual hearts to be willing to serve Him in another country, where most of the members don't speak the language, and have the enthusiasm and energy to leave behind our comforts of home to maybe in some small way make dreams come true for others brings to mind the scripture, "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him." I Cor. 2:9

Don't feel left out. You too, can be a part of God's work in the Dominican Republic. Contact Bob Stevens at the DDG or ask any of the team members how you can be involved in making dreams come true in the Dominican Republic.
